# Cambridge City Tops Hagerstown

### Wampus Cats End Season 4<sup>th</sup> In EIAC; Tigers Finish 5<sup>th</sup>

CAMBRIDGE CITY.-The . Cambridge City Wampus Cats finished their football season with a 34-6 win over Hagerstown here Tuesday night to take fourth place in the final Eastern Indiana Athletic association (EIAC) standings.

The Wampus Cats had two wins in five EIAC games while Hagerstown finished the loop with one win in five tries. Cambridge City was 6-3 in all games while the Tigers were 3-5.

Cambridge City started its first touchdown drive when it blocked a punt in the first quarter. It took the ball on the Hagerstown 30 and four plays later Charles Carlson went through center from the 12 and Brent Bundy plunged over for the extra point and a 7-0 Cambridge City lead.

On the second play of the second period, Kurt Wilkinson plunged over from the four for Hagerstown's only score. The Tigers had taken the ball on their own 15 and marched 85 yards on 11 plays with. the key one being Wendall Dale's 23-yard run.

Carlson hurled a 19-yard pass to Bundy on the ninth play of a 69-yard drive for the score and Paul Close plunged over for the point after touchdown and a 14-6 Cambridge City lead at halftime.

In the third quarter, Larry Stanley went over from the one after Jim Raby intercepted a Hagerstown pass on

the 27 and moved it to the 25. That drive carried nine plays. Bundy hurled the ball to Jerry Thompson for the extra point.

Cambridge City again got the ball in the third quarter and took it downfield for a score when Hagerstown was forced to punt. The Wampus Cats took the kick on their own 34 and Close immediately drove into Hagerstown territory with a 21-yard run. On the next play, Stanley made a 14-yard run to take the ball to the 10. Close came back with a six-yard skip and finished the drive with a four-yard carry for the touchdown.

In the fourth. quarter, Paul Schneider of Cambridge City ran 15 yards, climaxing a 65-yard drive that took 14 plays. It was Schneider's first touchdown of the year.

John Patterson, Sylvan Schwegman, Larry Waskom and Raby were outstanding for the Wampus Cats on defense.

# Wampus Cats Whip Hagerstown Tigers, 34-6; End Football Season With 6-3 Record

Displaying one of their finest, if not the finest all around effort of the year coach Buzz Duff's Lincoln Wampus Cats closed the 1959 grid season with a scintillating 34-6 victory .over the arch-rival Hagerstown Tigers Tuesday night at Lincoln Memorial Field here.

Speed was a determining factor in the Cats margin over coach Bruce Hamman's eleven as right halfback

Chuck Carlson scored two TDs and shared rushing yardage laurels with quarterback Brent Bundy and left halfback Paul Close.

The win clinched fourth spot in the EIAC standings for Cambridge and gave them a season record of 6-3. The Tigers are 1-4 in the conference and 3-5 overall.

The Tiger-Cats battle was another classic despite the victory margin of the Red and Blue, with crisp blocking and savage tackling by both clubs.

The Cats scored their first touchdown midway of the first period after grabbing a Tiger quick punt on the 32. Three plays later halfback Chuck Carlson raced 12 yards on a. reverse into the end zone. Quarterback Brent Bundy scored the extra point on a plunge.

Hagerstown scored on a 77 yard sustained drive on fine running by fullback Wendell Dale, quarterback Bill Murray, and halfback J. C. Smith and Kurt Wilkinson. Wilkinson getting the TD on the second play of the second quarter on a four yard off tackle slant. Dale's kick for extra point was wide.

The second score for the Lincolns came near the close of the period climaxing a 68 yard drive with Carlson snatching a 19 yard pass from Bundy for the six pointer. Halfback Paul Close added the extra point by plunge.

The Duffmen took a lot of 'starch' out of the Tiger hopes early in the third stanza when captain and tackle Jim Raby intercepted a Tiger jump pass on the 25 yard line. Fullback Larry Stanley subsequently bombing over from the two. Bundy's pass to end Jerry Thompson added the point-after-touchdown.

A 46 yard drive in four rushing plays accounted for the Wampus Cats fourth TD with Close getting it from the four: Bundy's pass for extra-point was no good.

The winners final tally came late in the fourth quarter with halfback Paul Schneider rambling 15 yards on a reverse for the TD. Close plunged the extra point across.

The Cambridge backs were able to chalk up sizeable gains on most rushing plays throughout the last half, while their defense contained the dangerous Tiger

runners between the 30 yard lines except for a final drive that ended with the gun on the 18 yard mark.

Outstanding on defense for the winners was Raby, John Patterson, Sylvan Schwegman and Larry Waskom.

# Wampus Cats Close Season With Decisive 34 to 6 Victory Over Hagerstown Score In Every Quarter

# **Score In Every Quarter Of Homecoming Game**

Cambridge City's Wampus Cats closed out their 1959 grid season in a burst of glory before a large Homecoming game crowd Tuesday night as they crushed traditional rival Hagerstown, 34-6.

The Cats scored in every quarter of the game, leading 20 to 6 at halftime, and adding another seven points in each of the final quarters.
